

INTERVIEW: Hugh Grant interviewed by Jenelle Riley

This interview was conducted as part of a SAG-AFTRA Foundation event. SAG-AFTRA is the American association for registered actors (SAG-AFTRA stands for Screen Actors Guild – American Federation of Television and Radio Artists). Jenelle: Thank you for being here. It's such a thrill1.

I have been warned that you don't really like people fawning over you².

Hugh: On the contrary!

Jenelle: I don't know if that's a polite British thing, but you're okay with that?

Hugh: Yes, absolutely.

Jenelle: Because (cause) there will probably be a lot of it tonight.

But I do want to (wanna) start at the beginning. Obviously...or maybe not obviously, but you were raised in England with some pretty impressive ancestry, like...people from like the military and aristocratic descendants.

Hugh: It says that on Wikipedia.

Jenelle: Yes.

Hugh: The military bit is right, the aristocratic bit is, I think, **rubbish**³, but I'm delighted it's there. Why not!

Jenelle: I think Americans think that anyone with an accent has aristocracy in their background. Ehm...but when did you develop an interest in performing?

Hugh: Ehm...it's the same old story. I'm sure everyone in the room, assuming pretty much that most people here are actors, it would have been the same old thing, just **showing off**⁴ as a child, doing silly voices, liking the **limelight**⁵, you know.

Jenelle: And at what point did you realize that this could be a career?

Hugh: Well, ehm...that happened in a strange way, because I had done messing around⁶ acting, school acting, university acting, though that wasn't my subject, and then when I left university, because I had decided to go and do another degree at another university, a sort of postgraduate degree. And during that summer, as I was revving up for⁷ that, I went to a screening of this strange student film that I'd shot while I was at Oxford just for a laugh⁸, and these agents said "do you want to be an actor?" And I said, well no, because I'm going off⁹ to do this MPhil, and then suddenly I thought - actually, maybe just for a year, instead of writing essays, I'll act, because I'd always liked it. So I said yes. And immediately I was cast in a film, actually – Mutiny on the Bounty, with Mel Gibson.

Jenelle: You were in that one?

Hugh: Well, no (because)...I wish I had been. It was a nice part, very exciting, you you know, at that age. Suddenly it was going to be twenty weeks in Tahiti, and what seemed like a fortune in terms of money. And ah...and then in those days in England if you weren't already a member of the union, Equity, you couldn't do a film, you had to go and earn your Equity card doing regional theatre. So they wouldn't let me do the film in the end, and so I thought, well - okay I'll go and get a **bloody**¹⁰ Equity card. So I went off to Nottingham Playhouse and played "tree in wind" and "third shouting peasant".
