

PHRASAL VERBS

TRANSITIVE PHRASAL VERBS

Transitive phrasal verbs take an object. Transitive phrasal verbs can be separable [S] or inseparable [INS].

- We will **carry out** a review of the procedures. (carry out: perform a task or activity [INS]
- He **set up** the company five years ago. (set up: to help establish something [S])
- They were brought up by their mother. (bring up: bring up [INS])
- She wants to up **give up** smoking. (give up: to stop doing an activity [S])
- Did you **find out** what happened yesterday? (find out: discover the facts about something [INS])

TRANSITIVE VERBS INSEPARABLE

Inseparable Phrasal Verbs [INS]: prepositions cannot separated from the verb.

- While looking for a letter I **came across** an old photo of my mother. (come across: to find by chance [INS])
- I get on well with my boss.

 (get on well with: have a good relationship with [INS])
- We should go over the documents tomorrow.
 (go over: review [INS])
- I always try to **keep up with** the latest news. (keep up with: to stay up to date [INS])
- She can't **put up with** his insults anymore. (put with up: to tolerate or accept something unpleasant [INS])



PHRASAL VERBS

TRANSITIVE VERBS SEPARABLE

Separable Phrasal Verbs [S]: prepositions can be separated from the verb (the object can be placed between the verb and the preposition).

- They decided to **call off** the game because of poor weather. They decided **to call** the game **off** because of poor weather. (call off: to cancel a planned event [S])
- You need to fill out the application form.
 You need to fill the application form out.
 (fill out: compete a form [S])
- He made up the whole story.
 He made the whole story up.
 (make up: invent [S])
- She **took off** <u>her gloves</u> and put them on the table. She **took** <u>her gloves</u> **off** and put them on the table. (take off: remove clothing, undress [S])
- He turned on the tv after dinner.
 He turned the tv on after dinner.
 (turn on: to start or activate something [S])

INTRANSITIVE PHRASAL VERBS

Intransitive phrasal verbs don't take an object.

- My grandfather **passed away** last year. (pass away: to die)
- His car broke down on the way home from work.
 (break down: stop functioning)
- They **grew up** in the nineteen fifties. (grow up: become an adult)
- She **dropped by** this morning to say hello. (drop by: to visit without an appointment)
- The company **closed down** a few years ago. (close down: close permanently)
